Executive Summary

Introduction:

Netaji Subhash Mahavidyalaya (NSM) is situated in a rural area under the Dhwanjanagar Gram Panchayat of Udaipur Sub-division in the Gomati District, Tripura. In spite of its rural existence, NSM boasts of being one of the most populous colleges of Tripura which housed 4286 students during the academic session 2020-21. Generally, students are admitted from different socio-economic and cultural backgrounds. True to the spirit of communal harmony of the state, the college encourages a strong positive relation among the students. The College came into existence in 1964 and it was taken over by the Government of Tripura on 21st September 1979 and was renamed as 'Udaipur Government Degree College'. During 1986, the College was shifted to its present location from Kirit Bikram Institution (KBI). Initially the college started by offering courses in Arts stream and gradually Commerce and Science streams were also introduced in 1987 and 1997 respectively. On 23rd January 1997, marking the birth centenary of the great son of our motherland, Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose, the College was renamed as 'Netaji Subhash Mahavidyalaya'.

It is approximately 50 km away from Agartala, the state capital and just 7.6 km away from the 'Mata Tripureshwari Temple' one of the 'Shakti Peethas'. This college, situated alongside NH8, has good access to the state capital as well as other remote areas of Gomati District. It is a co-educational college affiliated to the Tripura University. The College received recognition from the University Grants Commission (UGC) under 2(f) and 12(B) as Netaji Subhash Mahavidyalaya on 31st March 2004, and accredited "B" by NAAC in 2015.

The historical importance of the city, Udaipur where the college is situated finds its reference in the writings of the prodigious Nobel laureate poet Rabindranath Tagore like 'Rajarshi, 'Bisharjan' and 'Mukut'.

Vision:

Netaji Subhash Mahavidyalaya aims at instilling insight and cognitive ability into the minds of its students so that they can generate an enriched environment for the world with their sensitive and competent nature.

The College strives to chisel out the latent individual talent through inclusive education that encourages unity in diversity and enhances emotional quotient among the students. The Vision Statement of the college, 'साविद्याविमुक्तये' which means "that is knowledge, which liberates", underscores the idea that

knowledge liberates one's soul and leads it towards self-actualization. The statement encapsulates the vision of the college which believes in forming convictions and inculcating human values, professionalism, awareness against superstition and scientific temper in all sections of students.

Mission:

To fulfill its mission, the college aims:

- To disseminate knowledge and impart holistic and multi-disciplinary education to all section of students irrespective of caste or creed
- To create optimal learning environment and support system for students
- To inculcate wisdom, intellectual discipline, social and emotional competence in the students
- To promote inclusive education along with student centric learning
- To make aware about environmental awareness and climate change issues as well as management of waste to wealth
- To promote skill development for livelihood generation for sustainable growth
- To make students aware about cyber security
- To instill spirit of nationalism among the students
- To make students aware of their social duties and responsibilities

- Dedicated and qualified faculty members with a mix of experience and youth
- Enrolment of meritorious students from neighbouring districts

Institutional Weakness :

- As an affiliated college, NSM has enjoyed less autonomy in executing academic reforms. Being a government sponsored college, NSM faces a number of financial, administrative and academic hurdles.
- Regular faculty to students' ratio is inadequate.

- Space constraints in proportion to students' strength
- Inadequate laboratory space with respect to students' strength
- The college does not have any girls' hostel.
- The college does not have campus placement facility.
- Limited research facilities

Institutional Opportunity :

- The college is close to NH8 and has good access to the district's outlying areas;
- Placement cell may be made more vibrant
- Digital facility may be enhanced
- Vocational courses may be introduced
- To Promote research activities, faculty members are encouraged to approach different funding agencies.
- Innovative changes in teaching-learning-evaluation may be enhanced
- Construction of separate library and auditorium
- Number of skill development training may be increased under NSDC
- Installation of College Management Software
- Alumni linkage may be strengthened for betterment of the college.

Institutional Challenge :

- Being an affiliated college under Tripura University, NSM experiences lack of autonomy in syllabus framing.
- Faculty members face the slow pace of approval to attend Faculty Development Programmes & Signing of Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) for projects.
- Livelihood generation for maximum students
- As placement cell activity is centrally regulated by DHE central portal, college authority is unable to conduct campus interviews.
- Being a government college, funds to enhance physical infrastructure is a major challenge
- College faces the challenge of accommodating one of the highest enrolments in Tripura
- High enrolment and inadequate permanent faculty strength pose a challenge in pursuing research and publication and
- Increasing regular faculty strength and laboratory spaces is another challenge.

Criteria wise Summary

Curricular Aspects :

- Being affiliated to Tripura University, (A Central University) Netaji Subhash Mahavidyalaya (NSM) follows the syllabus and curriculum framed by the University. However, the college innovates within these academic structures to assure holistic development of its students.
- CBCS has been implemented since 2014 with 6 programmes in honours & general in arts, commerce and sciences running 37 courses in 19 academic departments. All these courses are enriched with experiential learning through field trips, surveys and project works.
- Academic process of the college is streamlined with academic calendar, master routine, departmental routines and also subject orientation for students.

- Curriculum is enriched with crosscutting issues like professional ethics, gender, human values, environment and sustainability.
- At NSM, dialogic education and prevailing feedback system ensure transparency and accountability on the part of stakeholders. Regular feedback has been collected from teachers and students and analysed thoroughly. Actions have been taken by the authority time to time.
- NSM faculty members regularly update their expertise through active involvement in faculty development programmes, curriculum reviews and evaluation. The esteemed faculty members also participate in different decision-making bodies of the University.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation :

- Seats filled against reserved categories during the last five years is 60.52% on an average.
- NSM prioritizes the students' intellectual, social, emotional, and artistic growth and makes a conscious effort to review and improve pedagogical practices. Through internal exams students are categorized as slow and advanced learners and accordingly measures are taken such as re-exam, tutorial classes, providing study materials, online supports etc. Additionally, there are WhatsApp groups that offer students all time support. Besides these, advanced learners are also supplied with reference books, online *website links like* Swayam (<https://swayam.gov.in/>), You Tube links, Admission Entrance, etc.
- Student to full time teacher ratio is on an average 82:1 for the last five years. However, guest faculties are engaged to abate the gap in providing academic support.
- The formal mentor-mentee system is being used for all honours students and some general students since 2018.
- NSM ensures student-centric learning and the institute promotes experiential learning through laboratory and field studies, study tours and mandatory projects. Campus surveys on bird(<https://www.nsmahavidyalaya.nic.in/campus%20birds%20nsm%20compiled.pdf>) & butterfly(<https://www.nsmahavidyalaya.nic.in/Butterfly%20NSM.pdf>) was conducted by the department of Mathematics.
- Faculty members of the college use ICT enabled classrooms to improve the teaching - learning process and make it more effective. Different online platforms and modern tools such as LCD projectors, computer/laptops/smart phones are used in the classrooms.
- Power-point presentations are used in the class to make the topic more comprehensive with visual impacts.
- NSM follows the rules and regulations of the University regarding examinations. After Internal examinations, answer scripts are properly evaluated and marks obtained by the students are displayed. Students usually report their grievances and the concerned departments take care of it.
- NSM is blessed with continuous support from qualified teaching faculty members having PhD degree (42.16% on an average).
- The college ensures evaluation of course and programme outcomes in various ways so as to make the learner skilful and competent enough to meet the present-day challenges.

Research, Innovations and Extension :

- Besides teaching-learning involvement, faculty members also engage in research to promote the College's academic excellence. Project paper in 6th semester inculcates research acumen in students.
- NSM maintains a "Seminar-Workshop Committee" that organizes seminars, conferences and workshops on cutting-edge issues. Besides conducting 34 seminars and conferences over the last five years, NSM also organized two webinars on "Intellectual Property Rights" to educate students as well as faculty members about patents, copy rights, and trademarks.

- It needs special mention here that one of the faculty already patented on Diet Cooker [Design No.320733001' Indian Patent Office Journal No. 40/2019 Dated: 04/10/2019] and another faculty filed a patent on anti-cancer molecule [Filed Number:202211030491 dated 27-05-2022]. The faculties of NSM published considerable number of research articles in reputed journals and book chapters during the assessment period. The faculty members frequently presented papers in different national and international seminars and workshops. Recently, Department of Bio-technology, Government of Tripura, has sanctioned one project on “Vermi Composting” to the college.
- Extension activities are organized by National Service Scheme (NSS) and National Cadet Corps (NCC). The NSS wing hugely contributes to extension activities which literally reflect “Not Me but You” slogan. NSS unit regularly conducts surveys in the adopted village to find out various issues related to socio-economic condition, sanitation, housing, education, environmental awareness. Accordingly, numerous extension activities are carried out by NSS in the areas of environmental protection, health and hygiene, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, blood donation, traffic safety and tree plantation among others. Apart from these, NSS organizes a 7-day long NSS special camp every year. NCC has two units-boys and girls who take part in Swachh Bharat Summer Internship Programme, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Fit India Movement, Atma Nirbhar Bharat, Digital Literacy, Health and Hygiene, Blood Donation, Environmental Awareness, Tree Plantation etc. NCC wings had conducted online awareness programme on importance of physical and mental fitness covering 5 villages.
- Extension activities are conducted by the departments of Human Physiology and Commerce. Zoology department has distributed vermi-compost among the farmers at free of cost to encourage them in organic farming.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources :

- NSM has adequate infrastructural facilities to ensure smooth teaching learning process. Buildings are certified with Fire safety and Disaster prevention measures.
- Average percentage of expenditure for infrastructure augmentation excluding salary in the last five years is 50.96 Lakhs.
- As a part of curriculum, laboratory facilities are extended to students of nine departments, three each from Physical Science and Bio-Science along with English, Psychology and Geography. Safety measures are adhered to while the laboratories are in use.
- ICT facilities, Wi-Fi, adequate number of classrooms, laboratories, and seminar room with public address system are available in its campus.
- The College is endowed with a semi-automated library having 38781 text and reference books, journals and e-journals through NLIST (INFLIBNET) and e-Granthalaya including an e-corner and copier facilities. Expenditure towards purchase of books and journals is 2.15 lakhs on an average during the assessment period.
- An ‘Indoor Sports Facilities Centre’ equipped with multigym and a Yoga centre is maintained by Department of Physical Education. Students are groomed and motivated to participate in inter-college, state, national and international level sports competitions.
- The college playground is utilized by the students for outdoor sports.
- NSM has a 50 seated ST boys’ hostel to address the residential and financial crises of students belonging to far-flung areas.
- College has a well-run canteen.
- The college has installed an iron removal plant to provide clean and safe water.
- A solar power plant with a 5 kVA capacity is available in the campus.
- For safety and security college installed CCTV in academic building, bio-science building and college canteen.
- Separate common rooms for Boys and Girls are available in the campus. Two vending machines, one in the girls’ common room and another in girls’ toilet are at hand.

- Three separate rooms are available for NSS, NCC boys and girls respectively.
- Separate department spaces are provided for all departments.
- Adequate sound system is available for regular playing the national anthem.
- The authority takes initiatives for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities.

Student Support and Progression :

- NSM gives financial support through procurement of different government scholarship schemes. A separate stipend section with a faculty nodal officer operates in the college. On an average, 41.32 percent of students are benefitted through scholarships.
- Through Mukhyamantri Yuba Yogayog Yojana (MYYY), 823 students were benefitted with smart phones in 2021.
- Language and communication skills through language lab, computing skills through Computer Lab and life skills through Yoga centre are provided to students.
- College has conducted coaching for competitive examinations and Joint entrance examinations to ST students through 'ST Coaching Centre'.
- Students' representation is included in certain administrative committees to instill creativity, concentration level and leadership ability among them.
- The Alumni Association of the institution has a separate room inside college premises and meaningfully contributes towards the cause of the college by providing both financial and other kinds of assistance on and off. Notable works of the association are installation of the statue of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose in the college, blood donation camp and plantation programme in the college.
- 'Placement cell' makes students aware of placement related opportunities in conjunction with DHE Tripura. The cell also organizes career counselling workshops.
- Grievance cell of NSM addresses all issues pertaining to students' grievances.
- NSM supports students for skill development and livelihood generation through Mushroom Training Centre and Vermicompost units. Recently college registered under the NSDC for skill hub.
- The college encourages learners' representation and involvement in cultural, co-curricular and extracurricular activities such as freshers' welcome, games and sports, drama, essay, debate & quiz competitions, blood donation and so on.
- Students normally join B.Ed., Masters in different universities after completion of undergraduate courses.
- Students of NSM have qualified in State and National level competitive examinations and have eventually been placed in teaching and administrative service over the last five years.
- Committee for prevention of sexual harassment, anti-ragging committee, SC-ST cell provide in-campus student support. Complaint boxes are installed in every building of the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management :

- The college leadership strives to promote the institution's vision and mission.
- Governance, Leadership and Management of NSM resolutely promote inclusivity, transparency and accountability through efficient handling of administrative and academic issues. The statutory committees of the college formed by the Principal consist of the faculties, non-teaching staff and students.
- Professional development training programs were organized by the institution for teaching and non-teaching staff.
- The institute participated in the NIRF ranking 2020.

- Different committees discharge the responsibilities of admission, examination, academic coordination, cultural and social activities, etc.
- In the macro level, NSM follows the directives of the Directorate of Higher Education, whereas in the micro level the college chalks out its own strategies with special focus on planning and implementation, teaching-learning processes, research, collaboration and extension, academic, infrastructural and internal quality assurance activities, etc.
- The college conducts financial audits both internally and externally on regular basis. The internal wing of the Directorate of Audit, Government of Tripura carries out the internal audit on all financial transactions, and it is the office of Accountant General (AG), Government of India, that carries out the external audit separately in three to four years' time gap.
- Regular faculties of the college are recruited by Tripura Public Service Commission and guest faculties are recruited by the College authority as per rules laid down by the Directorate of Higher Education. Teachers' performance appraisal, generally assessed by the Directorate and assigned bodies like IQAC, is documented through Annual Confidential Reports and it is deemed necessary for Career Advancements of individual faculties.
- The IQAC of the college ensures academic progress of the faculty members and leads them towards professional development by adopting practices at par with national standard. Academic and Administrative Audit 2020-2021 has been conducted in the academic departments. Various seminars/webinars, vocational trainings, awareness campaigns are organized. Teachers' participation in FDPs/Refreshers/Orientations and publication of articles in various reputed journals are also encouraged.
- The college has an RTI unit to address any citizen's queries.

Institutional Values and Best Practices :

- NSM upholds gender parity by ensuring a safe and conducive learning environment for its girl students.
- A Women's Cell has been formed by the college to promote women empowerment and to protect the rights of girl students and women faculties.
- There is an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) that addresses the complaints of sexual harassment against women, if any
- Two sanitary vending machines have been installed, one in the girls' wash room and the other in girls' common room.
- The institution encourages the use of renewable energy sources, takes initiatives for waste management, rain water harvesting, proper distribution of water in its campus.
- Green initiatives are in regular practice
- Green audits on energy, waste, water and environment have been conducted in 2021
- Institution provides inclusive environment for celebrating the days of national importance
- NSM sensitizes students and employees towards the constitutional obligations and
- The code of conduct for all stakeholders has been displayed in the institutional website and a continuous awareness on it has been carried out through a display system installed at the entrance of the academic building.

Best practices of the institution in the last five years:

- Best students of final semester are given due recognition by the respective departments
- Daily trilingual 'Words of the Day' taking relevant terminologies from the departments
- Playing of National Anthem on the campus at 12 noon
- Green practices
- Skill development programmes for students and

Netaji Subhash Mahavidyalaya (NSM) offers several courses in Arts, Science and Commerce and therefore it has ample scope to adopt the multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach to education as envisioned in NEP-2020. NSM is equipped with adequate infrastructure and equally qualified teachers to accommodate all the challenges towards execution of the same. As it is an affiliated college of Tripura University, NSM requires the revision of Curriculum prescribed by the parent University to wholly implement the policy. As a preparedness for NEP, two days workshop on “Implementation of NEP” was held on 22nd – 23rd February 2022 organized by Tripura University in which Prof. Harekrishna, Department of Statistics, Faculty of Engineering & Technology, Chaudhary Charan Singh University, Meerut and Prof S. K. Dubey, Department of Higher Education M.P., Bhopal recommended certain structures for successful implementation of NEP-2020 for Tripura University. Accordingly, Dean of faculty of Science, Arts and Commerce framed a task force for different subjects wherein formation of Board of Under-Graduate Studies (BUGS) was also suggested. Members of BUGS from NSM are Dr. Dipti Das, Department of Botany, Dr. Sudhan Debnath, Department of Chemistry, Dr. Abhijit Paul, Department of Mathematics, Dr. Parthasarathi Debray, Department of Human Physiology, Dr. Srijita Barman Roy, Department of Computer Science & IT, Dr. Rabindra Kumar, Department of Physical Education. Dean, Faculty of Science, Arts and Commerce has proposed year wise structure for UG and PG programmes under Tripura University as per NEP-2020. Students of UG has to take any three major subjects from own faculty from 1st to 4th Semester, any two major from the studied subjects of previous semester in 5th & 6th Semester. In the 7th and 8th semester any one from the studied subjects from 5th & 6th semester may be taken. Minor or elective subjects are to be taken other than major subjects from MOOCS. In the proposed curriculum, student can opt for optional subjects according to their choice.

	<p>Industrial training/survey/project shall be provided from the available facilities in the state. Keeping that in mind, subject wise task force prepared the curriculum and submitted to the respective Deans. After that, it was placed in BUGS meeting held in the month of July, 2022 and BUGS also approved the same with necessary modifications and now it is ready for implementation. NSM discussed the details of NEP-2020 in the Teachers' Council meeting held in the last Teachers' Council meeting.</p>
<p>2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is going to add a revolutionary dimension to Indian Education system. Its student-centric approach will enable every student to achieve academic success. However, the parent university has to adopt the framework first and the college will be ready to implement the same under the new NEP-2020.</p>
<p>3. Skill development:</p>	<p>Skill development is an indispensable part of NEP 2020 and NSM is already registered with National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) and the TC ID of which is TC183246. The name of the training centre is Netaji Subhash Mahavidyalaya and the TP ID of which is TP127112. The college has one active Mushroom Cultivation Training Centre and one Vermicomposting Training Centre under the supervision of Departments of Botany and Zoology respectively. NSM already organized Motor Driving Training for BPL & Antodaya girls' students under Tripura Beti Bachao Beti Padhao Abhiyan (TBBBPA) scheme. BioFloc training has been conducted too. A proposal for financial assistance has been sent to NEC for increasing numbers of Vermicomposting units in the College premises. The college also houses an English Laboratory that may be used for providing skill courses like Spoken English, Communicative English etc. Besides these, implementation of NEP-2020 will provide further scope for NSM to empower its students to gain employability skills.</p>
<p>4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>The institute has four language departments namely, English, Bengali, Sanskrit and Kokborok besides all the Arts departments that provide Indian knowledge system in its curriculum. The faculty of NSM are trained to design and deliver the course contents through online mode since COVID-19 times.</p>
<p>5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):</p>	<p>The institute adheres to the implementation of Learning Outcomes based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) laid down by the UGC. It follows the Curriculum prescribed by Tripura University.</p>

	<p>Thus, all the programmes offered by the college follow their respective POs, PSOs, and COs for curricula management. For smooth application of the Programme outcomes, these are discussed by the faculty in class and they are also available on the college website. Attainment of outcomes is measured from the performance of students in the internal assessments and University examinations. The college however is ready to embrace the process of OBE once the parent university adopts NEP-2020.</p>
<p>6. Distance education/online education:</p>	<p>One of the essential parts of NEP-2020 is the democratization of education. The institute has a distance education centre run by Tripura University and IGNOU. However, the pandemic has emphasized the importance of Online Education as an integral part of teaching-learning process as it was the only medium for facilitating a conducive learning environment. NSM has adequate infrastructural facilities and qualified faculty to disseminate online education. Every building has Wi-Fi enabled internet connectivity facilities for its stakeholders, enabling NSM to adapt to the new normal situation while preparing for NEP-2020.</p>

1. Curricular Aspects

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Answer:

- Being affiliated to Tripura University (a central university), Netaji Subhash Mahavidyalaya (NSM) follows the syllabi and curriculum framed by the University. The academic committee of the college, along with the IQAC and routine committee, develops the academic calendar to ensure effective implementation of curriculum. Accordingly, master routine is framed for all the disciplines for documentation of teaching-learning process.
- For effective delivery of course content, power point presentations are used to make the content comprehensive with audio-visual impacts in addition to conventional teaching aids. Interactive sessions are hallmark of class management framework that makes the learning process vibrant. These practices are supplemented by debates, group discussions, quiz programs, surveys and study tours.
- Library with 38,781 books and printed and e-journals support the learning needs of students and faculties. The library's Network Resource Centre (NRC) is a storehouse of knowledge providing access to INFLIBNET, e-granthalaya etc. Academic discourses of NSM makes continuous efforts to conduct seminars and workshops (both on physical and virtual modes) to make the learning process both intensive and extensive.
- A 'Computer Laboratory' in the department of Computer Science with 52 (fifty two)

desktops/laptops provides access to students who are in need of computer learning. The computer lab serves as a place for students in the fourth semester to receive practical orientation for their foundation paper on "Computer Skill." In addition, these computers are used for curriculum-based activities by students in the departments of Commerce, Mathematics, and Physics.

- In addition, a workshop was conducted in collaboration with (NIELIT), Agartala to impart hands-on knowledge to the students on sustainable livelihood practices. Again, to keep the learning process uninterrupted and comprehensive during the pandemic situation, digital learning tools namely Google Meet, Zoom, upGrad, Webex, StreamYard, Whatsapp, Telegram, YouTube, Google Classroom etc were used by all the faculties and students.
- Experiential learning is an integral part of the syllabi to inculcate comprehensive development of educands. In doing so, these tasks are accomplished either by laboratory based experiments or by conducting field visits. In this regard, department of Physical Sciences, Bio Sciences, Commerce, History, Geography, Psychology etc. are following these methods regularly especially for sixth semester students. Besides, projects are prepared by sixth-semester students as a compulsory component of the curricula.
- As a complementary to the usual teaching-learning process, the faculties of the institution identify the advanced learners and support them with recent developments on the subjects. Slow learners are imparted tutorial classes to lessen the gap between slow learners and advanced learners. Learning outcomes of the students are evaluated periodically across the academic sessions through 'Sessional Examinations' and University examinations. Internal Assessments are conducted by NSM itself through the supervision of the 'Examination Committee' of the College and the End Semester examinations are conducted in the college at the behest of the Tripura University.

- In order to conduct the academic practices smoothly, the institution adheres to the academic calendar prepared by the college in collaboration with the IQAC. The academic session starts with the admission process as and when notified by the Directorate of Higher Education (DHE), Government of Tripura. Admission committee is formed with the faculty members of the college headed by a nodal officer and convener for smooth conduct of admission process. The Committee follows the rules and regulations of the admission process prescribed by the DHE, Government of Tripura. Accordingly, 'Students Help Desk' is formed in the college and a 'Help line number' is also published in the college website for catering to the queries of the intending students.
- The Academic committee and the IQAC of the college finalize the academic calendar in accordance with guidelines prescribed by the University. The Routine Committee frames the master routine which provides the slot for teaching-learning processes. Accordingly, Heads of the Departments, in consultation with the concerned faculty members prepare respective departmental routines as per the slot provided. Finally, Departmental routines are submitted to the Principal for final approval of the same.
- Thrust of academic discourses of NSM rests upon 'Continuous Internal Evaluation' process by conducting seminars, group discussions, viva-voce, lectures and quizzes apart from imparting normal classes.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Answer:

- In addition to imparting syllabus-oriented knowledge, the institution promotes and propagates the issues of gender sensitivity, environmental awareness and professional ethics. Department of Philosophy organizes different programs like lecture on Professional Ethics with due focus on educational, media, business, medical ethics etc.
- A ‘Women’s Cell’ has been constituted to look into the matters relating to the women and gender issues. Recently, the cell has conducted a survey on “women empowerment” in collaboration with Department of Psychology of the College and reported accordingly for its implementation. The Women’s Cell has organized a 30-days training on motor car driving as part of the campaign “Tripura Beti Bachao Beti Padhao” for 21 female students of the institution in order to make them skillful for a sustainable living. This endeavor, which is a step forward towards women empowerment, is expected to provide them a livelihood in future.
- As a part of promoting environment and sustainable development, NSM gives special emphasis on environmental awareness, plantation programme over the years and for this NSS unit of the college plays leading role. The college has formed "Environmental Awareness and Climate Change Committee" during 2020-21 session that organized events on similar issues. Annual "Vanamahotsav" are observed with active participation of students and faculty members. A "Plantation and Adoption Programme" was also organized during 2020-21. Further, green audit including waste, energy, environmental, water and environment audits have been accomplished as a part of green initiatives.
- In order to promote livelihood generation for a sustainable living, department of Zoology has a ‘Vermi-compost’ unit where vermi-compost is produced from wastes or organic manures. This Vermi-compost unit is also used for training students on sustainable livelihood generation. Further, a workshop was organized by department of Zoology in collaboration with “Swachchata Action Plan Committee” of NSM during the year 2021 on the preparation of ‘leaf compost’ which serves the purpose of waste management for livelihood generation and promotes sustainability.
- NSM has a “Mushroom Cultivation Training Centre” under the Department of Botany which provides hands-on-training on mushroom cultivation. The institution has a Skill-hub whose prime objective is to make the students skillful in mushroom cultivation and preparation of vermi-compost with a vision to generate alternate employment opportunities for students.
- Department of Commerce has a curriculum based paper on business ethics to instill moral code of

responsible business practices. Issues relating to human rights, gender sensitization, value-based education and ethics are part of syllabi in subjects like Political Science, Economics, Education and Philosophy. Moral judgment, moral standards, environmental ethics and ethics of management are integral part of the syllabus of Honours course in Philosophy. Environmental science is taught to the students of 3rd semester as a part of curriculum based foundation course.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Answer:

The college admits students from various socio-economic backgrounds. The college undertakes every possible measure to assess the learning levels of the students. The students are counseled, guided and made oriented at the time of admission regarding the course, mode of internal assessment and the final university exams at the end of each semester, curricular and co-curricular activities, rules and regulations of the institution and about the facilities available in the college as well. The list of courses, curricular and co-curricular activities, rules and regulations, facilities available etc are also published in the college prospectus which is provided to the students before the beginning of academic sessions. At the beginning of each course, teachers assess the entry level behaviour of the students, their knowledge about the course and accordingly special programmes for advanced learners and slow learners are planned. The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special programmes for advanced learners and slow learners. After the completion of syllabus, classes are also repeated for slow learners and lately admitted students. Repetition of topics and doubt clearing sessions go on parallel with scheduled classes on demand by any student. In the CBCS system, students are required to select course subjects based on their core competence, aptitude and skills. The teachers of the institution counsel the students regarding the scope of different courses being offered as well as provide guidance in relation to the student's aptitude and competence. Opportunity is also given to the students for changing their options if they are not able to cope with the courses selected by them. Students have all time access to the teachers for the purpose of clearing doubts and receive counseling even on one-to-one basis. The institute offers mentor-mentee system where an individual teacher is assigned a few number of students for the purpose of mentoring them both in academic aspects and career counseling. Advanced students are given input on the subject with recent updates. Invited lectures and seminars are organized frequently with an expectation that advanced learners would get an orientation to the burning issues and recent updates on the subject. Tutorial classes are organized to help the slow learners to cope with the subject. Besides such formal initiatives, students are always welcome to communicate with the teachers as and when they require.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Answer:

The institution makes every possible effort to realize the potential of its students. The institute always encourages and ensures student-centric learning through various ways. Debate and quiz competitions are frequently organized in the institution on relevant social and economic issues and the students are always encouraged to participate in such in-house programmes. Moreover, students of the institute participate in various programmes organized by Govt. of Tripura and other non Govt. organizations. Besides this, students actively participate in group discussions and presentations conducted by faculties in the class in order to make the class more interactive. Project Work is a mandatory part of the syllabus and this provides a practical orientation to the topics covered in the syllabus. Students are given individual projects and class assignments to make the learning experiential. The support systems ensured by the institute are in the form of a Wi-Fi enabled library, Computer Lab, reading Room, ICT based classrooms (Smart Classrooms). Students are trained regarding Basic Life skills such as First Aid, Self Defense, Swachh Bharat Programme, and Personal Hygiene and Sanitation. In pursue of holistic development of the learners, the institute organizes cultural and other co-curricular activities and also encourages the students to participate in such events organized by other institutions. Students are taken for study tours to the sites of interest in order to get them familiar with the field/natural conditions. Such activities play an integral role in allowing a switch over from absorption of information while learning during academic sessions and creating a safe space to relax, interact, collaborate, think out of the box and nurture their talents and leadership capabilities. To increase the concentration in various activities, the college has framed many committees and clubs including the Cultural Committee, Sports Committee, Placement Cell, Debate Committee and Red Ribbon Club. Intra college sports competitions are organized, where students exhibit talent in variety of games, to foster spirit of togetherness and leadership. During lock down, owing to spread of corona pandemic, the faculties of the institute have taken utmost care to continue with the teaching learning process via online mode of classes. The institute has framed routine for online classes for smooth conduct of the process. Further, study materials have been provided by the faculties from time to time. You tube channels have been created and lectures have been streamed so as to ensure participation of maximum number of students according to their convenience. Further, many departments have wall magazines where opportunities are given to the students to portray their talents in creative writing. Department of Chemistry has received a national award for displaying students' projects in the wall magazine.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Answer:

Faculty members of the college use ICT enabled classrooms to improve the teaching - learning process and make it more effective. The teachers of the institution have adapted themselves to the usage of ICT enabled learning process. Different online platforms are extensively used for conducting class lectures and students are encouraged to learn and practice through interactive activities. LCD projectors, computer/laptops/mobile systems are used in the classrooms. Platforms like You- Tube, E mails, WhatsApp group, Telegram, Zoom and Google classrooms have been widely used to continue teaching –learning process during corona pandemic. College and University websites contain information and announcements regarding course content, syllabus and examination schedules. Academic links are made available in the college website for the benefits of the learners. Free Wi-fi facility is also available in the campus for the students, teaching faculties

and the non-teaching staff. The library provides free access to computers and open access journals and also to the journals subscribed by the college. e-books and e-journals are available for both the teachers and students which makes teaching-learning process un-interrupted even during the pandemic. Access to INFLIBNET has further added to ICT enabled learning which is cost effective. Such systems are more beneficial for the students who belong to financially weaker section.

Photocopy facility is also available in the library. Power-point presentations are made in the class to make the topic more comprehensive with visual impacts. Contents available in educational podcasts enrich the learning process and make it more interesting. Teachers have streamed their lectures in you-tube so that students can learn at their convenient time. It is a continuous practice of the institution to conduct seminars for updating the knowledge base of both the students and the faculties. During lock-down, such seminars have been conducted in the form of webinars where students made online participation and benefitted from highly learned resource persons from different corners of the country. Further, the students made online participation in quiz and recitation competition conducted by Department of Higher Education.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Answer:

Netaji Subhash Mahavidyalaya is affiliated to Tripura University. Internal assessment and internal practical examinations are conducted according to the University norms and in line with the dates already scheduled in the academic calendar (with minor changes as and when required). Notifications of internal examinations along with examination routine are displayed in the notice boards of the respective departments and in the common student's notice board of the college. The assessment process is conducted following the directives of the University. The answer scripts are properly evaluated by the teachers and the marks obtained by the students are displayed in the notice boards. The head/HOD-in-charge makes a notification regarding showing evaluated answer scripts to the interested students on stipulated date and time and the answer scripts are shown to the students accordingly. Proper explanation is given to the students if inquired. Further, those who fail to score satisfactory marks in internal examination are given another chance to write internal examination and improve their performance. Any issue regarding dissatisfaction of the students is addressed by the department itself and if the issue remains unresolved then students have the provision to lodge their complaints to Student's Grievance Cell. Grievances of the students relating to internal assessment are looked after by Examination Committee. The Examination Committee takes utmost care in resolving issues raised by the students either relating to internal examination or any other issue relating to University Semester Examination.

The institution is very particular in addressing the grievances of the students relating to internal examination. Any grievance, though rare, is addressed in a transparent manner within the stipulated time. The institute ensures that grievances of the students regarding internal examination are duly addressed with utmost clarity. Records of internal marks are properly maintained by the concerned departments. Students usually report their grievances (if any) to their concerned departments and the faculties of the departments take care of their issues. If the students are not satisfied with initiatives of the department, they may make an appeal to the Examination Committee and grievances relating to internal assessment are duly addressed and resolved by the Committee.

The institute, in all its endeavors, ensures transparency and clarity of the teaching-learning process. The teachers and students of the institution are well aware of the course content and course outcome of different programmes being offered by the institution. In this regard, the course contents and course outcomes are made available in the website of the institution so that a learner before taking admission to the college may have a complete idea of the courses being offered by the institute and their outcomes as well. Being an affiliated college, the institution has no freedom to design its own course content. The course content is prescribed by the university itself. Course contents are also available in the prospectus of the college which are given to all the students who intend to get admitted in the college. Course outcomes are also provided in the website of the institution. The college prioritizes the interest of its students and endeavors to update the students with recent developments in the subjects. Skill enhancement is another aspect to materialize the course outcomes. Many initiatives have been taken to imbibe livelihood generating skill amongst the students. Mushroom cultivation, Preparation of vermi-compost and leaf-compost demands a special mention. The course outcome also claims that we make our students socially responsible. Many extension activities are organized by the NSS and NCC wings of the college in this direction. Our students render services in the adopted village of the college, and many other corners of the town. During lock down kits and other materials have been distributed by the NSS Volunteers and the NCC Cadets. During Diwali Mela NSS Volunteers have assisted the administration in maintaining COVID Norms. Our students regularly participate in various co-curricular activities which leads to their holistic development. A skill hub has set up in the college to imbibe skill in the students for livelihood generation. Hence, the students and the teachers are aware of both course content and outcomes and endeavors towards achieving them.

A brief description of the same is given here. Internal assessment is conducted following the guidelines prescribed by the University. This is done in accordance with university regulations regarding the process of internal assessment. Improvement testes are also conducted by the departments for those who do not score satisfactorily. Internal assessment procedure ensures clarity of the process and also improves the learning ability of the students. Student's participation in group discussions, quiz and debate competitions, poster presentations are ensured by the institution in order to broaden their knowledge base and enhance their capability of presentation, public speaking and critical analysis. Teachers of the college are particular about correcting and assisting the students when their performance is found unsatisfactory. Project work is a mandatory part of the syllabus of final semester which helps the students in gaining a fundamental understanding of academic research in which they may get involved while pursuing higher studies. Field based experiential learning is a part of the syllabus of the courses offered by the departments of Geography, Zoology, Botany, Human Physiology and Psychology. The institution ensures participation of the learners in seminars and other academic and literary programmes to broaden their knowledge and experience. Participation of the students in various International, National and State-level seminars/webinars /workshops, literary activities like debate, speech, quiz competition, Student Project Programs enrich them and make them competent and provide a global exposure.

4. Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 *The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.*

Answer:

NSM is equipped with well-maintained classrooms, laboratories, classrooms with ICT facilities, library reading room, internet surfing center, conference/seminar room with Public Address (PA) system and computing equipment to adopt the modern teaching-learning system.

Classroom: NSM has 24 classrooms with electricity, solar connectivity, green boards etc. There are departmental rooms for every subject along with departmental library, notice board, incumbency board and cabinet for wall magazine. Drinking water facilities like water filters, purifiers and cooler are available outside classrooms.

Laboratory: In Arts discipline, the college has well equipped laboratories for the departments of Psychology and Geography. The laboratory of Department of Geography is equipped with barometer, hygrometer, thermometer, topographical sheets, etc. Language laboratory facility is available with the Department of English. Department of Computer Science is equipped with 52 computers.

College has well equipped science laboratories with computer and ICT enabled smart class rooms. In the faculty of bio sciences, department of Human Physiology is well equipped with biochemistry, hematology, human performance and molecular and immunology laboratory. Department of Zoology has a well equipped laboratory. Zoology department also maintains a 'vermi compost Unit' for the purpose of training and livelihood generation among the students. Botany department has well equipped instruments. Botany department also maintains a 'Mushroom Cultivation Training Centre' and 'Nursery' in the college. Faculty of Physical sciences has well equipped laboratories, instruments & other required facilities.

Library:

- The college library has a collection of 38,781 text and reference books.
- NLIST (INFLIBNET) offers online access to study materials like e-books and e-journals both for students and teachers.
- The College Library remains open from 10 am to 5 pm on all working days.
- The library has an internet surfing center with 4(four) desktop computers for students and faculties.
- Photocopier facility is available.
- Besides, links for SWAYAM, NPTEL are given in the college website along with educational videos prepared by the NSM faculties.
- Electronic display board is set up for new arrivals in front of library.

Computer Centre: Computer Science department of NSM has a separate computer centre accommodating fifty two (52) computers. Besides, different departments of the College have 22 computers. Open source softwares like Auto Dock, Auto DockVina etc are used by faculty member for research purposes.

Health Facility: As the College is situated very near to Gomati district hospital, it avails the health services from the hospital authority as and when required. During examinations, a temporary health desk is set up by district medical administration to provide prompt services to ailing students.

Transportation Facility: NSM is situated beside the National Highway No. 8 and it provides easy access and connectivity to the students.

Safety and Security Measures:

- Academic Building, Bio-Science building and College canteen are kept under CCTV surveillance.
- Fire extinguisher is installed in the campus as per guidelines provided by the Department of Fire, Agartala and they have issued a clearance certificate in this regard.

The institution has adequate facilities for cultural and sports activities.

Cultural Activities:

- The College has a glorified history of a strong cultural background since inception. Separate committees, namely ‘Cultural Committee’, ‘Committee for Drama, Debate and Literary Activities’ and ‘Magazine Committee’ are formed for execution and monitoring of cultural and literary activities.
- The committee members supervise the Saraswati Puja and other cultural activities performed during Fresher’s Welcome, Teachers’ Day, Quiz and Debate Competitions, celebration of national and international commemorative events.
- The Cultural Committee performs as a mentor to the students interested in cultural activities.
- There are harmonium, flute, coconut cabasa, wooden dholak and a set of Tabla, etc in the College as supporting instruments for cultural activities.
- College seminar hall which is well-connected with PA and Lectern system is utilized for different cultural activities.
- Wall magazines where students showcase their write-ups, paintings and other creativities are published by almost all departments.

Playground: The playground of the college is utilized by the students for practicing various games and sports. Practical classes of the Physical Education department are also conducted at the playground.

The students of this college participate in inter-college, state, national and international level sports competitions and win prizes. It is a matter of pride that the college has won Tripura University Inter College Men’s Kabaddi Championship; four players from the College have been selected for All India Inter University Tournament. Football team of the college has won State championship in 2022; the college has also bagged junior championship in Body Building. The physical education department of the college aims to provide a safe and healthy atmosphere for its students and staff members. Separate committee for ‘Sports and Games’ is there to plan, execute and monitor the issues relating to games and sports.

Indoor Sports Facilities Centre: The Indoor Sports Facilities Center of the College has a well-furnished multi-gym with modern training equipment like treadmill, walker, dumbbell, barbell, etc.

The Yoga centre: Yoga Centre is also a part of the "Indoor Sports Facilities Centre" under the Department of Physical Education. Every year International Yoga Day is celebrated in the institution on 21st June with

great enthusiasm. Importance of Yoga is highlighted and students are encouraged to practice yoga for a healthy living. The institution emphasizes on sports - both indoor and outdoor games. Indoor and outdoor games facilities are utilized by the students and faculty members under the strict supervision of the department of physical education.

The library has around 38, 781 books on all the subjects offered by the institution with an open access reading space for teachers and students. Desktops are available for the purpose of internet surfing.

Further, the library has subscribed to 17 academic journals to keep its faculties and students updated regarding recent developments in various disciplines.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

Answer:

The institution frequently updates its IT facilities including the Wi-Fi facility. The college, in order to adapt with the changing modern teaching-learning techniques, has equipped itself with modern technology based learning tools. To meet the emergent needs, the IT infrastructure of the College is regularly improved and modified along with updation of softwares as well.

There is a Computer Laboratory in the College in the Department of Computer Science with requisite number of computers and these computers are made accessible to the students for learning purpose. Students of Science departments have computer science as a component in their syllabus and thus they make use of computer science laboratory for their practical classes. Students admitted to major and general courses in commerce, physics and mathematics are directly benefitted from the computer laboratory.

The college has five classrooms and one Seminar hall with ICT facility for conducting classes and academic programmes. Seminars and workshops are also conducted in the seminar hall with the aid of LCD projector and PA system . The college possesses seventy four (74) desktops and laptops used for academic purposes. Besides, there are 16 desktops for administrative work.

Separate Laptops are provided to each department and to the conveners of RUSA and IQAC. The college also owns other ICT equipments such as printers, photocopiers, projectors, smart TVs, PA Lantern, speakers, etc., used in academic and cultural activities of the college. Keeping pace with the modern technology all official works including salary related matters of both the faculties and the staff, other financial transactions are made through online treasury using HRMS (Human Resources Management

System). At present, the college has a broadband connection, and this facility is accessed and utilized for day to day work of the institution.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Answer:

Proper maintenance and utilization of physical and academic support facilities are ensured by the HOD of different departments and librarian with the help of development committee, academic committee, RUSA Committee, e-tender committee, government e-Marketing (GeM) committee, lower purchase committee in consultation with Teachers' Council. Development Committee and RUSA committee jointly prepare plans for undertaking maintenance works, developing infrastructure, etc. All works are accomplished

through tender system/ GeM as per financial standard norms or rules laid down by the DHE, Tripura from time to time. Works like creation of physical assets are entrusted to Government agencies like Public Works Department, Rural Development Department, and Municipality etc. Maintenance and up-gradation activities, related to civil and electrical works, done by different agencies are verified by development committee along with the HODs of the concerned departments.

Laboratory: Departments of physical science, bio-science, psychology and geography have laboratory facilities. Attendants are there to maintain the laboratories and render help during practical classes and examinations. Laboratory equipment/machinery, gas connection, pipeline etc. are checked regularly to ensure smooth conduct of practical based learning in laboratories. Stock books are maintained by the departments, if necessary, to keep a list of chemicals, glassware and any other instruments purchased and used in laboratory.

Library: The library has an advisory committee, which meets at regular intervals to discuss various issues related to library facilities, services, and activities. The college library is subscribed to NLIST programme of INFLIBNET. A link to web OPAC has been provided in the library page of college website for remote access. Whenever books are purchased, they are enlisted in the register and later they are made available for the students and faculty members with the support of a register for lending books. Students are issued library cards for borrowing purposes. They are allowed to retain the books for 14 days.

Sports Complex: Games and Sports section in the institution is looked after by the Physical Education Department and the games and sports committee of the college. All the sports materials and equipments are stored in storeroom under the supervision of the Physical education teacher. A register is maintained with records of all the sports equipment available in the college. Students are allowed to have an access to the sports materials by making an entry in the register. There is a playground inside the campus where students play different outdoor games.

Classroom: Proper initiatives are taken for the maintenance of classrooms; for smooth conduct of teaching-learning process, HODs submit their requirements to the principal regarding repairs and maintenance of computers/laptops, procurement of departmental furniture, etc. The college authority takes quick initiatives to meet the needs of the departments. Separate routine and log-book are maintained for the ICT enabled class rooms. There is out-sourcing system for cleaning the college campus. Besides, major cleaning drives are initiated with the help of local Panchayat and paid laborers. Swacchata Abhiyan is conducted by the NSS Volunteers of the college.

5.4 Alumni Engagement

5.4.1 *There is a registered Alumni Association that contributes significantly to the development of the institution through financial and/or other support services*

The institution has an Alumni Association since 2012, registered in 2018 bearing the registration No. 6464, under the Societies Registration Act, 1860. Since its inception, the association has been functioning with the mission of extending possible assistances and co-operation to the college. The Secretary of the alumni association is a member of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College and usually attends the IQAC meetings regularly and provides valuable suggestions. Thus, Alumni Association helps the college in executing some of the decisions as well.

The prominent works that the Association has performed are:-

- The Alumni association of the College initiated the installation of the statue of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose after whom the College is named. The statue was installed in the College campus and was ceremoniously unveiled by the former Honorable Chief Minister of Tripura, Sri Biplab Kumar Deb on 23rd January 2020 in presence of a number of other dignitaries. The unveiling ceremony was followed by a grand cultural programme in the College campus in the afternoon.
- During Academic Year 2020-21, the Alumni Association had organized a 'Mega Blood Donation Camp' in the College in collaboration with the NSS Unit of the College on 22nd December 2021. The camp was inaugurated by Shri Pranajit Singha Roy, the Hon'ble Minister of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare, Transport & Tourism, Government of Tripura. A total of 45 persons including students of the college and members of alumni association donated blood on the occasion.
- On 20th July 2022, a plantation programme was organized by the Alumni Association where saplings were planted in the college campus. Sri Sheetal Chandra Majumder, Chairperson, Udaipur Municipal Council, graced the occasion as an esteemed guest. The Principal-in-charge of the college, other dignitaries, members of the alumni association, teachers and current students actively participated in the programme.

6.Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance of the institution is reflective of and in tune with the vision and mission of the institution

Answer:

The vision and mission of the institution serves as guiding framework in formulating the future course of actions both at the micro and macro level. The institution envisions to instill insight and cognitive faculty in the minds of its students. Further the college strives to explore the latent talent of its students. The college also sets its mission to make its students confident and responsible citizen. The college also strives to create an optimal learning environment so as to inculcate wisdom, discipline and social and emotional competence.

The institution has a mission to offer vocational training on skill development for livelihood generation. Further, it is attempted to make students socially responsible by engaging them in various extension activities through NSS and NCC. The institution also strives towards sustainable development goals by means of making efforts towards environmental consciousness.

Being affiliated to Tripura University, the institution has to follow the university guidelines regarding examinations and other academic aspects. Regarding admission and administrative issues the college follows the directives of Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of Tripura. The governance of the institution is in consonance with the vision and mission of the institution.

Besides completion of the syllabus, brain storming sessions are conducted for holistic development of the college. Organizing quiz, debates and other literary activities are the continuous efforts made by the college.

Students are encouraged to participate in seminars conducted by the college and other institutions for updating the knowledge base with the advancements of knowledge in the subjects. For holistic development, students are encouraged to participate in extension activities, rendering their services to the society. Further, a skill hub has been initiated in the college which provides training on duck farming, mushroom cultivation, preparation of vermi-compost and leaf-compost. For smooth conduct of all the activities, various committees are formed by the Teacher's Council presided by the Principal.

Cadets and volunteers of NCC and NSS respectively, make efforts towards protection of environment through massive tree plantation, making the environment plastic free and many more. The institution has conducted green audit, waste management programme towards sustainable development goals.

The college upgrades its infrastructure, laboratories, library as well as insists on environment friendly campus including health and hygienic atmosphere for creating optimum learning environment and support system for students. Students' participation for creating environmental awareness along with inculcating ethics of self-discipline have been the hallmark. There are notable contributions of other key bodies like National Cadet Corps (NCC), National Service Scheme (NSS) and College Students' Union Council acting as a conduit pipe between the administration and students.

6.1.2 The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management

Answer:

The College follows decentralized management structure in rendering its services towards the students and the society as a whole. The institution performs its duties and responsibilities in a decentralized manner with the participation of all teaching and non-teaching staff.

At the onset of the academic year, the Principal, who is the president of the teacher's council in discussion with other office bearers forms various committees for accomplishing various administrative works. The committees are led by nodal officers/conveners with members. Notable among them are: Executive Committee, Academic Committee, Admission Committee, Examination Committee, Research & Seminar/Workshop/Scientific Programme Committee, Cultural Committee, Magazine Committee, Library Advisory Committee, Games & Sports Committee, Drama & Debate Committee, Anti-Ragging Cell, Development Committee, UGC Committee and Planning Board, Routine Committee, Student Council Election Committee, Girls' and Boys' Common Room Committee, Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment, Discipline Committee.

The Head of the Institution further delegates responsibility to some faculty members as Departmental Heads/ in-charges as per the guide lines of the Directorate of Higher Education to look after the academic and other issues of the departments. Besides, the committees of Teacher's Council, several other committees are formed for other administrative purposes as and when required. These include Lower Purchase Committee, Committee for Mukhyamantri Yuba Yogayog Yojana (MYYY) Tripura Scheme, 2021, Discipline Committee etc.

Lower Purchase Committee (LPC), approves purchase decisions for over INR 25,000 including order placed through Government e-Marketplace (GeM), act as vital cog relating to financial decisions of NSM. LPC comprised Principal of the College, Principal from local ITI (Industrial Training Institute), Drawing and Disbursement Officer (DDO) and Store Officer In-charge for maintaining transparency and accountability.

"MYYY Scheme Committee" was formed primarily to look into authenticity of reimbursement of cost of mobile purchased by students for academic endeavors in which more than 3000 students are likely to get reimbursement to the extent of Rs. 5000 per head. Discipline committee is formed to maintain discipline and decorum during working days inside the campus. The college has also organized vaccination drives for students, teaching and non-teaching staff.

In nutshell, four committees, namely Development Committee, Academic Committee, Admission Committee and Examination Committee, are formed to perform core functions pertaining to the routine activities of the College. Again, there are IQAC and RUSA committees supervise two assigned functions relating to maintenance of internal quality and institutional funding for College development works. The Drawing and Disbursement Officer (DDO) usually administer the financial issues of the college. Placement Cell facilitates students with issues related to placement managed centrally by the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Tripura.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The institutional Strategic / Perspective plan is effectively deployed

Answer:

In order to meet the changing needs and aspirations of stakeholders, the College resorts to micro and macro level strategic plans and try to deploy them effectively.

- **Planning and Implementation**

The institution, at the onset of the academic session, prepares academic calendar and tries to adhere to it

as far as practicable. All the events are implemented through the committees formed by Teachers' Council.

- **Teaching- Learning Process**

The College strives to impart student centric learning mechanism. Tutorial classes are taken for the slow learners. Interests of advanced learners are addressed through mentoring system and catering to their needs of advanced learning. Experiential learning is augmented through projects as a compulsory component of the syllabus.

- **Research, Collaboration and Extension Activities**

The faculty of the institution enthusiastically participates in research and extension activities. Teachers are actively involved in research activities and some are pursuing Ph.D degree. Faculties participate in Faculty Development Programmes and Refresher Courses on Research Methodology. The teachers participate in seminars conducted by the college and other institutions also.

- **Academic infrastructural facilities**

Well-equipped class rooms and laboratories ensure an ambient teaching-learning atmosphere. The college Library has sufficient books on each discipline, provides access to INFLIBNET for e-books and e-journals. Smart TVs and LCD projectors are used to impart knowledge with better visual impact. The institution strives to provide for all sorts of academic infrastructure as funds allow. The fund for such activities is mainly sourced from UGC, RUSA and State Government.

V. Student Support Activities and Student Progression

Government Scholarship schemes extend financial support to the needy and eligible students. College Placement Cell, in conjunction with DHE, Tripura, facilitates placement related activities of the institute. Skill hub in the college is registered with the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) for providing skill enhancement training on mushroom cultivation. The college has a language laboratory to provide orientation to students towards correct pronunciation of English language.

VI. Internal Quality Assurance System

The IQAC of the College makes a proactive role in assuring the quality of teaching-learning process, research and continuous learning process of the teachers, and overall development of the college. Teachers are constantly encouraged to conduct research for Ph.D degree, participate in FDPs and Refresher Courses for updating their knowledge. Frequent seminars and workshops are organized with the initiation of IQAC. Academic and administrative audit is conducted annually by the IQAC.

VII. Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college ensures holistic development of its students by engaging them in extension services towards the society. The best practice of the college is to render services to the society particularly in the adopted village. Skill development programmes are organized for the students in earning livelihood.

VIII. Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is governed by rules and regulations framed by affiliating university (Tripura University) for academic activities and by Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Tripura for administrative and financial activities. The Principal leads the college management with assistance from the Teachers' Council and the administrative staff.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

Answer:

The Organizational Structure of the College consists of the principal, faculties, non-teaching staff and the students. The Development Committee and Teachers' Council are the important decision-making bodies of the College.

Regular faculties are recruited by the Govt. of Tripura through Tripura Public Service Commission. Guest Faculties are recruited by the College as per rules framed by the Directorate of Higher Education (DHE), Government of Tripura.

Usually, vacancies for Guest Faculties are advertised in local dailies along with Walk-in interview in the college premises. Recruitment Boards are formed by the authority to conduct interviews and guest faculties are selected on the basis of API scores attained by the candidates following UGC norms.

The Teachers' Council (TC) of the College along with Development Committee convene meetings for important matters to discuss issues relating to finance, infrastructure and issues related to the overall development of College. Further, the academic Committee looks into the matters of curricular and co-curricular activities of the College. The Principal is assisted by respective Head of the departments, the Teachers Council (all teaching faculty) and the Non-Teaching Staff.

Regarding quality enhancement and its sustenance, the IQAC of the college fervently works for overall improvement on a regular basis.

College Library, with its reading room, well connected network resource centre having INFLIBNET facility and e-Granthalaya etc., serves a primary component of entire teaching-learning process.

Other Important Bodies like National Service Scheme (NSS) and National Cadet Corps (NCC) wings are serving important functions for holistic development of the students. Anti Ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Committee, Committee against Sexual Harassment etc. performs specified roles in maintaining a congenial teaching-learning on behalf of the Principal. The primary objective of these committees is to ensure compatible teaching-learning ambience within the college campus.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 *The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff*

Answer:

By virtue of its status as a Government Degree College, the institution has no welfare measure of its own. However, the welfare measures availed by the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college are as per the latest guidelines of the Government of Tripura from time to time.

The State follows UGC Pay Scale as basic component of the salary for assistant professors and associate professors and other allowances are as per the allowances of the State Government. For Post Graduate Teachers for Higher Education and non-teaching staff, the pay package is as per the State Govt norms. All teaching and non-teaching staffs are entitled to get House Allowance (HRA), Dearness Allowance (DA), Compensatory Allowance (CA) as applicable from time to time; Annual Increment @ 3% has been provided every year for teaching and non-teaching staffs of the college; Promotion under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) for Assistant and Associate Professors are provided as per the guidelines of the UGC/ State Government from time to time.

Assistant Professors and Associate Professors are awarded two or three advance increments from the date of awarding of M. Phil and PhD respectively as per the recommendation of the UGC.

As a part of in-service training/capacity building, faculty members are permitted to take part in Orientation/Faculty Development Programs/Refresher Seminars/Workshops etc.

Non-teaching staffs are also allowed to participate in training programs meant for them as a part of in-service training/capacity building; General Provident Fund (GPF), Gratuity, Group Insurance (GI), Interest free loans from GPF are provided to all staff members with refund facility within three years. The same is allowed without refund facility upon completion of ten years of service.

Medical reimbursement facility has been extended to all Gazetted Officers including Principal, Associate and Assistant Professors. Whereas, regular monthly medical allowance is provided to Group C and D employees as a part of allowances component; Casual Leave, Earn Leave, and Medical Leave are applicable to all staff members.

Apart from these, special leave in the form Child Care, Paternity etc as per State rules; Leave Travel Concessions (LTCs) named as Bharat Darshan is allowed every staffs subject to maximum of three times during the service.

Six months of maternity leave with pay is provided to women staff. Considering the importance of a mother in upbringing a child, the female employees are provided child care leave (CCL) for two years.

Teachers' self appraisal is a continuous process in Tripura and it is introduced by the State Government since long. Assistant Professors and Associate Professors have to profession assessed either by the

appointing authority (herein DHE), assigned bodies (like IQAC) as well as by the faculty himself/herself over the years.

Gazetted faculty members are stipulated to furnish information for Annual Confidential Reports (ACRs), as required by the Directorate of Higher Education (DHE) Tripura, to be ratified by the Head of the Institution on yearly basis. Through such disclosures, faculty members exhibit their professional development (in the form of new sponsored projects, publications as well as paper presentations in seminars and conferences etc.) along with contribution to regular teaching-learning process. Such performance appraisals are considered essential for Career Advancements of respective faculties usually examined and ratified by the Departmental Experts from the parent University (herein Tripura university) also.

The college IQAC is another body which looks into academic progress of each faculty members on a regular basis and submits the same through AQAR for respective periods. As matter of reinforcement annual student satisfaction survey are conducted every year. Departmental heads take active role in disbursing the feedback forms to students, either online or offline, as well as its confidential collection on the part of IQAC for overall assessment of faculty members. In case of online feedbacks, links are provided to students for its successful completion.

For Non-teaching staffs, no such ACRs are stipulated. However, training program for orientation to specific job related assignments are now-a-days being organized by respective authorities on case to case basis.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Answer:

Being a fully Government institution, the college follows the directives of Directorate of Higher Education (DHE), Govt. of Tripura for conducting internal and external financial audits periodically. Internal audit is conducted by the internal wing of the Directorate of Audit, Government of Tripura or by Chartered Accountants deputed to carry out routine work with respect to all financial transactions like purchases, procurements and salary and allowances including Leave Travel Concessions (LTCs) and so on.

The internal audit officials are required to check veracity of all transactions and whether this conforms to financial rules and regulations of the State Government from time to time. College cash book, stock register etc maintained by accounts section, authenticated by Drawing and Disbursement Officer (DDO) are also verified as per applicable rules and guidelines.

The external or special audits are conducted by the office of Accountant General (AG), Government of India separately usually occurring once in three or four years. The last audit of this kind was conducted by Accountant General, Tripura during March, 2019, and the report was satisfactory. Similarly, last two internal audits were conducted 4-6th January, 2021 and 10-12th January, 2022 respectively by the representatives from Directorate of Audit, Government of Tripura.

Another kind of audit is conducted now-a-days under taken by the DHE relating to fund received from Rashtriya Uchchar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA).

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Answer:

During the last five years or so, the College has been primarily provided with State Government Funds, funds from Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA), with the exception of University Grants Commission (UGC) funds, for harnessing development works inside the campus. For effective monitoring, Principal along with DDO and RUSA Coordinator of the college oversees the utilization of funds so received from the mentioned sources in consultation with the members of the College Development Committee, Lower Purchase committee, RUSA committee as deemed fit.

The strategies relating to mobilization of funds and its optimal utilization stems from the directives' issued by the DHE from time to time. The College, in its jurisdiction, channeled funds so received in an effective way for its optimum utilization in a given framework. The Principal, in turn, entrusts the job of utilization of available resources to respective coordinators of committees, the lower purchase committee (LPC) etc. as authenticated by the DDO for its successful completion. The funds so allocated are being employed for procuring equipments, chemicals, books and journals, accessories or any development works related to the College over the years.

Lower Purchase committee of the College plays a decisive role in approving purchase of materials valued below Rs.25,000 which does not require any tender/quotations. The College Development Committee, on the other hand, provides its approval for RUSA related disbursements whether or not purchased through Government e-Marketplace (GeM), a Public Finance Management System (PFMS) for online purchase of requisite items for governmental organizations. However, for placing supply order through GeM, bids are invited following the formalities and requirements as per law. Till date, majority of the purchases related to RUSA funding are routed through GeM with the exception of order placed to Tripura Forest Development & Plantation Corporation Ltd (TFDPC) for providing desk and bench for the College. Again, for providing books and journals, supply orders are directly placed to the publisher concerned as per applicable rules and norms.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the

quality assurance strategies and processes

Answer:

For maintaining internal quality and standards, the College IQAC takes an integral part in periodical accomplishment of jobs as assigned. In doing so, it plays a decisive role in ensuring quality of the functioning of both academic and administrative units of the College during the last five years or so. In order to develop scientific temper amongst students as well as to acquaint them face probable future challenges and opportunities, students are earnestly motivated by inculcating research culture through curriculum-based project work, either laboratory based or field survey based.

IQAC, on its part, recognizes the need for qualitative improvement in research culture continually by engaging faculties and students for higher academic pursuits. Accordingly, Action Taken Report (ATR) was instituted to throw light on specific activities aimed at achieving the desired goals. The thrust of such an exercise includes:

- Continuous encouragement for publication of research articles for faculty members in journals of repute
- Conducting seminars/webinars on a regular basis depending on ground scenario by allowing students to participate
- Facilitating participation in Faculty Development Programs (FDPs/Orientation/ Refresher courses) make faculty members conversant with latest developments in respective disciplines
- Encouraging faculty members for Minor/Major Research Project (MRP) proposals to different funding agencies like DST, UGC, ICSSR etc.
- Organizing ICT enabled workshops for faculties to facilitate use of technology in curriculum-based activity so as to make classroom pedagogy interesting and meaningful to learners
- To arrange classes in technology enabled classrooms for students to keep them abreast of latest developments in respective fields and their uses.
- Conducting annual students satisfaction survey (feedbacks) are part and parcel of IQAC quality control measures accorded top priority in the given direction.
- One of the best practices is to encourage students and faculty members to excel in co- and extra-curricular domains.

6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms and recorded the incremental improvement in various activities

The IQAC of the NSM, Udaipur resorts to periodic review of teaching-learning practices and learning outcomes of each department so as to initiate necessary steps wherever required. Technology enabled classrooms in each block with internet connectivity added another dimension to

teaching-learning practices of the College along with Language Lab, Computer Lab etc facilitates power point presentations on the part of students. Well connected Library with INFLIBNET, e-Granthalaya, reading rooms and book lending facility enriches both teachers and students in accomplishing academic endeavors. Results of outgoing batches reflective (securing ten positions at the UG level exam conducted by the Tripura University during 2020-21 academic session) of untiring efforts of both faculties and IQAC in pursuit of academic excellence.

The College again boasts of athletes who not only participated in national level events but also bring laurels both for the College and themselves over the last two academic sessions. Annual students' satisfaction survey (feedbacks) along with minutes of subsequent meetings points to potential areas of improvements, if any, in consonance with overall objectives followed and actions thereto.

Learner centric mentoring, again, by providing conditions for learner development and autonomy and positioning the teacher as learner, observer, and supporter of academic pursuits. Blending of education further provided opportunity to share study materials for online classes held and an occasion to impart intensive education in adversity. Collaborative arrangement in organizing seminars/webinars provided an opportunity for dissemination of knowledge enriching the faculties and students per se. Recent inclusion of National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) can be considered as a positive step in the given direction.

 - Bio-degradable solid waste of the canteen are kept in a specific pit for compost making.
- College has a compost unit under the Department of Zoology and (SAP) where vermi-compost and leaf compost are produced. In this way bio-degradable wastes management is performed. The vermi-composts are packed and sold to local people accordingly.

Practice- 1

1. Title of the practice

Skill Development Programmes for students.

2. The context that required the initiation of the practice

Analysis of student progression and profile of pass out students’ data of the college from past few years

points to the fact that the percentage of the pass outs getting private/government jobs or chance in any higher education courses is not satisfactory. Thus, the present practice was initiated to equip the students with some relevant technical skills which can improve their employability and help them in starting small entrepreneurial ventures. In line with this, the institution itself strives to earn some revenue by production and sell of products manufactured in the campus using mostly campus waste and active support from students themselves. For this purpose Vermi Compost Production from bio degradable component of campus waste along with locally procured cheap plant waste materials and Mushroom cultivation and sell of the products in prevalent market rate has been initiated. Also several other skill oriented student development programs are organized in the college.

3. Objectives of the practice

The objective of the practice is to train the students in some relevant technical skills which can improve their chance of getting employed or better can help them in starting small commercial ventures. Along with exploring the possibilities of institutional revenue generation, the main objective of the practice is to put before the students a small business model where their own expertise is used so as to encourage them to take up such entrepreneurial activities privately.

4. The Practice

Skill Development: - In NSM, Udaipur, skill development initiatives have been taken under the guidance of English, Zoology and Botany departments. Students' development program on Linux and LaTeX,

Vermi compost production, Leaf compost production, mushroom production, Biofloc fish farming, Development of Nursery and duck farming are exclusive skill development programs operated in NSM, Udaipur. Workshops were conducted separately for each program. Theoretical aspects of these units were elaborately explained and hands on training imparted to the students. Subsequently the functioning of the units started with minimal initial expenditure. After regular class activity students and teachers engaged themselves for these units and mention worthy output obtained. Compost fertilizer packets containing 5 kg are prepared and are being sold to the college staffs and local people. Mushroom packets of 1 kg are being prepared and sold to college staffs and local people. Good amount of revenue are being generated and deposited to govt. fund.

1. Title of the practice

Green Campus Practice

2. The context that required the initiation of the practice

Global warming, climate change, green house effect and ozone layer depletion are burning issues for the present day World. Environmental pollution is a big factor for these issues. So to aware all the stake holders of the college regarding these issues initiatives like plantation program, waste management program, Swachhata Action Plan (SAP) and resource conservation etc are essential. These will also make the college campus clean and green for healthy upbringing of the students.

3. Objectives of the practice

The practice is necessary to protect and conserve ecological systems and resources within the campus and also to ensure sensible use of environmental resources to meet the need of aspirants of the present and future generations. To integrate environmental concerns into policies, plans and programmes for social development and outreach activities, this practice is essential.

4. The Practice

Stakeholders of the College are keenly working to make the campus a plastic free, pollution free and environment friendly zone. Initiatives have been taken to include implementation of Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, water conservation policy, waste management, renewable energy management, rain water harvesting. Solid waste of the campus is cleaned regularly by outsourcing staff and NSS volunteers jointly so that no plastic is left in the field or anywhere in the campus. Waste management by segregation of nonbiodegradable and bio-degradable has been promoted with good number of dustbins in the campus.

Dry leaves of trees are collected and sent to vermi compost unit for compost production. Liquid wastes are produced from the science laboratories and these are directed to liquid waste pit by pipe lines so that natural vegetation and soil quality of the surrounding could be preserved. Sanitation in the campus is modernized and no foul smell comes from the lavatories.

Banamahotsav is celebrated every year frequently, where lectures are delivered and trees are planted in the campus. Stress is imposed on lesser use of conventional electricity such that the fans, lights and other equipments are kept switched off when not in use.

A solar energy project is installed with a 5kVA peak supply capacity which is functioning properly and this is also connected to the central grid. Awareness posters are pasted at prominent places in the campus so that water taps and electric switches are kept off after use. Rain water harvesting project is implemented in the Bioscience building.

SAP (Swachhata Action Plan) Committee is working tirelessly to ensure green campus activities. Green audit including water, waste, environment, energy has been conducted in the campus to make carbon neutral environment for sustainable growth.
